Pastor's Message

"Those who are deemed worthy to attain to the coming age and to the resurrection of the dead can no longer die, for they are like angels... God is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive."

Throughout His lifetime, Jesus taught a new way to God through faith. He consistently criticized the traditional ways of Israel, as tax collectors and sinners are given forgiveness, life, and hope. As His ministry draws to a close and He prepares for His death, the Sadducees have their chance to question the Messiah.



The Sadducees were the traditional priestly rulers of the temple and they did not believe in resurrection after death. They come to Jesus with an outrageous question that was asked to make Him look ridiculous. They pose a question about a woman who, in keeping with the law of Israel, which allows a childless woman to remarry the brothers of her husband, marries seven brothers in an attempt to raise a family. If there is a resurrection, "to whom will she be wife?" Jesus responds to the question by showing that they have completely misunderstood what the resurrection is. There will be a transformation of the sons of men into sons of God. The problem with the Sadducees was that they could only think in terms of the life on earth that they already knew. They were not open to the power of God, acting through the experience of a death that opens the door to new and abundant life.

This is a key element in our Christian faith. A God who only directs and cares for human life on this side of death can never be a part of the Christian faith. Death is not the end of our existence, and we are called to live our lives on earth with our vision focused on what is to come after death. If we are only concerned about our everyday lives and do not live with faith and hope in the power of the resurrection, we will be like the Sadducees, and our hope of eternal life will fade away. Death is not the end of the story and our faith as Christians guides us to live lives that are marked by the great joy and hope that only the promise of eternal life can provide for us.



2019 ANNUAL REPORT





Dear Parishioners,

I am pleased to share our fiscal 2019 Annual Report, which provides a financial summary and snapshot of our parish life and most recent year's accomplishments. As we pause to consider our achievements, it's humbling to reflect on our growth and exciting to visualize our future.

St. Stephen the Martyr is one of the largest Catholic parishes in Nebraska serving more than 600 students in our School, 900 youth in our Religious Education and Youth Ministry programs and 3,200 families, plus many more through our community care and outreach programs. Completed Pastoral Plan

With the help of the Pastoral Council, Finance Council and hundreds of Parishioners, a St. Stephen the Martyr Pastoral Plan was successfully developed. This five-year plan serves as a guide for our work and to help allocate Parish resources. Visions, goals and objectives were crafted for each dimension of parish life, including: Community, Worship, Leadership, Formation, Stewardship, Social Justice and Evangelization. Specific achievements from this plan will be reported in 2020.

Completed Critical Facilities and Maintenance Repairs

Critical repairs were made to our facilities, many of which were funded and completed by parishioners and internal ministries/organizations.

- Repaired and installed new protective glass in the Daily Mass Chapel
- Replaced carpet in the gathering space, hallways, offices and classrooms
- Built new ADA approved walkways at the South and North Church entrances, which removed the steps and replaced unsafe broken concrete; and installed new landscaping, irrigation and lighting
- Stabilized the Gonderinger Parish Center and made interior repairs
- Upgraded the School intercom, phone and security systems
- Completed insurance repairs to siding and roof, and replaced HVAC system and some appliances at the Parish Rectory
- Refurbished wood floors, re-painted walls, replaced wall mats and installed energy efficient LED lighting in the Gymnasium

Improved Communication

Through collaboration with staff and volunteers, communication, marketing, and brand awareness was improved. Specific accomplishments in this area included:

- Designed and launched new websites for both the Parish and School
- Refreshed Sunday bulletin
- Updated Religious Education, School and Evangelization/Catechist materials/templates
- Provided consistent weekly emails to parishioners and engagement with our online presence
- Implemented Ministry Pro Scheduler making Liturgical scheduling simple and efficient

Advocated Community Outreach

Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy serve as the guiding force for our community outreach and social justice work. We fed the hungry, clothed the naked, visited the sick, buried the dead, and visited the imprisoned. This work was accomplished daily by volunteers, staff and clergy and in cooperation with community partners. Highlights include:

- Served more than 350 families through our food pantry
- Visited parishioners in hospitals and care facilities, averaging 3-4 visits per week
- Took Holy Eucharist to the Home Bound, averaging more than 100 per week
- Organized over 36 youth service community projects/events through our Hearts Wide Open Service Squad

Budget Highlights

Through the generosity of our parish family we were able to boost our 2018 year-end giving by \$253,884. These funds helped with our operating shortfall as well as much needed deferred maintenance to our nearly 30-yearold facility. In addition to that financial support, volunteers organized and hosted several events, many of them with recordbreaking results:

- Martyr Mission: \$188,000
- Martyr Marathon: \$108,000
- Parish Festival: \$60,000
- Trivia Night: \$11,000

- Structural improvements to the Gonderinger Parish Center. This does not include the cost of new carpet or repairs to the Parish entrances which are expensed in the current fiscal year
- 2) The Parish covers the cost of utilities, maintenance repairs and custodial staffing to operate the School, and thus are not included in school operating expenses
- 3) 120 month, \$2.46m loan @ 3.4%. Remaining balance is \$164,067 scheduled to be paid in full by May 2020

Near Term Facility Assessment

St. Stephen's was constructed in 1991 and houses our worship space, parish and school offices, gymnasium and K-8 classrooms. In 1997 an addition was added to the school and in 2007 a neighboring child-care facility was purchased and converted for parish use.

While our buildings are structurally sound, at almost 30-years-old, many of our mechanical and HVAC systems are operating beyond their useful life-expectancy.

According to a recent parish facility assessment by BCDM Architects, near-term deffered maintenance will be required in the following areas:

Boosted Faith Formation, Catechesis and Evangelization Programs

In accordance with our faith formation vision: to invite and equip all to become Disciples of Christ and provide opportunities for all to encounter Christ so they are inspired to proclaim Him, many new opportunities were offered. Highlights include:

- Launched Martyr Jump Starter, a series on our Catholic beliefs and an invitation for spiritual growth
- Seen an increase in participation in our existing Adult Formation classes
- Began to invite parishioners into a greater awareness of our universal call to discipleship through information sessions regarding the Archdiocesan vision for Evangelization
- Increased the use of technology to reach a broader audience. Examples included Word on Fire via Flocknote, strategic Facebook content, and Stephen.org website hub for recorded Mass homilies, Martyr Jump Starter sessions and Deepen Your Prayer Life series
- Revitalized small group study concept with 13 new groups added during Lent
- Taught Religious Education to 858 students through more than 140 volunteer Catechists and hired a new RE Director
- Worked with an average of 100 youth weekly through 3 core programs: Life Teen (High School), Edge (Middle School) and What About Wednesdays (High School)
- Attended Steubenville Youth Conference with 70 Teens & 12 Adults

Reenergized School

This fiscal year marked important change within our school as we transitioned leadership of our Principal and Vice Principal. Key accomplishments included:

- Enacted ongoing staff development to include Balanced Literacy, Gradual Release of Responsibility, Guided Instruction
- Aligned curriculum standards in accordance with Archdiocesan benchmarks and implemented MAP testing
- Evaluated instruction using AdvancedEd observation tools
- Incorporated service-related field trips and class projects into curriculum
- Developed and implemented Transitional-Kindergarten within our preschool offerings
- Revised school policies and safety protocols
- Improved STEM programing
- Enhanced communication through consistent principal updates, teacher training and new website
- Utilized marketing grant from Archdiocese of Omaha that was used for recruitment initiatives such as an Open House, school website, Facebook advertising, signage, and updated information brochures/mailings
- Continued engagement momentum of our volunteer parents through Home and School
- Began strategic planning with the guidance of our School Advisory Board
