

Advent is four weeks of **preparation** that direct our hearts and minds both to remembering Christ's birth and to Christ's second coming. It's a reminder to be alert and ready, not weighted down and distracted by the cares of this world (Lk 21:34-36). Advent is a time of preparing, quieting, and disciplining our hearts for the full joy of Christmas. We await in quiet anticipation for the beginning of the best thing to ever happen in the world – the coming of our Salvation, Jesus Christ.

1ST SUNDAY

OF ADVENT

"Be watchful! Be alert!

You do not know when

the time will come."

- Mk 13:33

I would guess that most people can identify with this passage from the Prophet Isaiah. Have you ever felt this way? There are lots of mixed emotions when life gets tough. Perhaps you want to blame God for your troubles, or you might feel guilty. Maybe you simply stand before God and humbly ask for mercy, patience, or forgiveness.

This is what is happening in the lives of the Israelites. There is a lot of despair and hopelessness in their feelings. They have forgotten the Covenant of love and faithfulness that they made with God, and they turned their backs on Him. Because of their selfishness and sinfulness, they have lost their homeland and are living in exile in Babylon, so they are in a desperate situation. At first, they blame their sin on God ("Why do you let us wander, O Lord, from your ways..."), but then they come to their senses and realize that only God can forgive their sins and resolve their difficult situation.

This is a good message for us as we begin our journey through the season of Advent. In these days of joyful and hopeful preparation for the coming of Jesus Christ, it is good for us to examine the sins that have "exiled" us from God or the community of the Church. What do you wish to change about yourself, but have been unable to? How have you resisted being shaped by God?

Preparing for Christmas and ultimately for the end of our lives, means that we must stop wandering in our sinfulness and come back to the life that God desires for us. Are you ready for the journey home?

The Big Goal

"In six years, each parish in the Archdiocese of Omaha will be a Missional Community."

- Archbishop Lucas, October 2020

A missional community is made up of individuals that not only encounter and know His love but actively proclaim His love to the greater community. We must look beyond ourselves and discover how we can bring mercy, strength, and forgiveness to all of God's people. At St. Stephen the Martyr, we are focusing on three areas to aid our Parish in transforming into a missional community: 1) Collaborative Leadership, 2) Clear Path of Discipleship and 3), Culture of Generosity.

Collaborative Leadership

This week, we are reviewing Collaborative Leadership, a way of exercising authority in which the pastor invites and equips certain of the faithful to use their gifts in the service of leadership. We asked parishioners, Matt & Katie Keller, to share what Collaborative Leadership means to them. Please take time to read their message and reflect on how God may be calling you.

Dear Fellow Parishioners,

The Archbishop's Goal to establish Collaborative Leadership within parishes is key in our journey toward becoming a missional community. A pastor's first priority is to meet the spiritual needs of his flock. We as lay people have been putting too much pressure and responsibility on our priests in the past few decades. Priests were never meant to lead everything that happens at a parish; their ministry is to support the mission and vocation of the laity.

God has made each one of us individually, and we are each called to participate in his plan of salvation in a unique way. *The Lord has given us all natural talents along with supernatural gifts by grace of our baptism and confirmation.* We need to continually discern and ask Him how He wants us to use these gifts to bring others closer to Christ.

Being a leader in our community is not just about "getting stuff done". We are involved in a number of ministries, but it's not about filling a seat or agreeing to help out of a sense of guilt. *It is about forming relationships, walking with people in their faith journey, and deeply investing in specific people within our community.* Your call to collaborate with Father Dave, Father Zach, and our parish staff could take on many forms. It could be helping with the food pantry, being on one of the staff committees, leading or consistently attending a small group, signing up for and praying a holy hour each week for those in our parish who are suffering, serving as a lector at Mass, joining the choir, mentoring engaged couples, or just talking to someone who looks alone at donuts after Mass.

In the past few years, a verse from Psalm 116 has come to us over and over: **"How can** *I repay the Lord for all the great good done for me?*". The Lord has blessed us in countless ways in our lives, and truth be told, there is no way for us to ever repay His kindness. The best we can do is listen to the voice of the Holy Spirit when he invites us into the lives of other people to share His great good. We invite you to listen for that voice with us, so that our parish can become a missional community to change the lives of every parishioner and those in our community.

Meet the Kellers:

Matt and Katie Keller and their family have been parishioners for six years. As passionate members of our St. Stephen the Martyr community they have been involved in many areas. The Kellers serve as baptism class instructors, small group leaders, marriage formation mentors, and host a monthly Srodo (an evening for young adult fellowship). Katie also



serves as a teacher in our Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program, an EMHC and homebound minister, and Archdiocesan coordinator for the Seven Sisters Apostolate. Matt is currently serving on our Pastoral Council.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Question: Why haven't Catholic Churches gone the way of disposable cups for wine distribution?

Answer: If a Catholic has ever attended a Protestant worship service and saw the communion service that was offered for that community, one of the things that might have stood out was the use of small, disposable cups for distributing the wine or grape juice. This is in stark contrast to the precious metal chalices used in Catholic churches during the Mass.

Although practices for Protestant Christians can vary (ranging from large shared chalices, to personal-use cups, to dipping the bread in the wine/grape juice), the norms governing Catholic practices are fairly direct: "Sacred vessels are to be made from precious metal. If they are made from metal that rusts or from a metal less precious than gold, then ordinarily they should be gilded on the inside. In the Dioceses of the United States of America, sacred vessels may also be made from other solid materials that, according to the common estimation in each region, are precious ... they are to have bowls of nonabsorbent material" (nos. 328-330). Rather than being a commentary on the beliefs or practices of those other communities, these rules are intended to highlight the reverence that Catholics have for the bread and wine consecrated at Mass, which become the Body and Blood the Lord. ©LPi



Both obligations can be fulfilled on Sunday, just not at the same Mass. Saturday evening and Sunday morning Masses are liturgically 4th Sunday of Advent Masses. Sunday afternoon and evening Masses will be Christmas Vigil Masses.


