2ND SUNDAY OF LENT

a voice, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him." Suddenly, looking around, they no longer saw anyone but Jesus alone with them. - Mk 9:7-8

Pastor's Message—From Father Dave "On the evening of the first day of the week... Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, 'Peace be with you... As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' And when He had said this, He breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained." , -John 20:19a, Ž1-23



When was the last time you went to Confession? If you haven't celebrated this great Sacrament of healing recently, why not?

I have heard some creative answers to that question in my years as a priest. "Why should I have to tell my sins to another human being?" "I tell my sins directly to God, and I know that He forgives me." "Confessing my sins makes me feel uncomfortable." "The priest will treat me differently when he sees me in public." In these four weeks leading up to Holy Week and Easter, I would like to offer a series of articles to teach about the Sacrament of Penance and to assist you as you prepare to celebrate this beautiful Sacrament in preparation for Easter.

When Jesus rose from the tomb on Easter Sunday, He entrusted the ministry of forgiveness and healing to His followers (see the above passage from St. John's Gospel). From the beginning, reconciliation and forgiveness have stood at the heart of the Church as the enduring gift of God to believers and the enduring mission of the Church to the world. This is our work: to heal divisions in us and among us, and to re-establish communion and harmony within us. Historically, the Sacrament of Penance has been understood as the "Second Baptism", the Sacrament that leads us back to the Eucharist, just as Baptism first brought us to the Eucharist. We know that when we sin, we separate ourselves from God and from others. By celebrating the Sacrament of Penance, the union with God and His people is restored, which is most deeply and profoundly expressed in Sunday Mass.

From the early days of the Church, the Eucharistic Liturgy has been seen as the primary Sacrament of Reconciliation. We believe that, in the Penitential Act at the beginning of the Mass, where we call to mind our sins and pray the Confiteor or the "Lord, have mercy" together, that the venial or "lesser" sins of our lives are forgiven. For us to receive the Body of Christ, we have to become the Body of Christ, healed of all division. Besides Sacred Scripture, the foundation of what the Church teaches about Reconciliation can be found in Church Law, paragraphs 959-991. The Church also teaches, through the Catechism of the Catholic Church that anyone who is aware of committing a mortal sin must not receive Holy Communion without receiving "sacramental absolution" (CCC #1457). It also teaches that, "while it isn't strictly necessary, confession of everyday faults (venial sins) is nevertheless strongly recommended by the Church" (CCC #1458).

The process of reconciliation and forgiveness is not a private act, something that can be accomplished only by asking God to forgive us in a private prayer. We do believe that if we express heartfelt sorrow for our sins that God will indeed forgive us, but the Church also teaches that we need to experience that forgiveness through the Sacramental life of the Church. In the Sacrament of Penance, we come face-to-face with the reality of sin in our lives and that our sins have separated us from God and others. We speak to another human being-a priest-acting in the person of Christ, about the areas where we need God's grace to heal our brokenness. Strengthened by God's grace, we re-commit ourselves to the difficult task of avoiding sin and we agree to do some act of penance as a remedy for the sickness of sin and a renewal of life. Finally, we hear that we are forgiven through the prayer of absolution.

Next week I will write about the roles of the priest and the penitent in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

"So whoever is in Christ is a new creation: the old things have passed away; behold, new things have come. And all this is from God, who has reconciled us to Himself through Christ and given us the ministry of reconciliation, namely, God was reconciling the world to Himself in Christ, not counting their trespasses against them and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. So we are ambassadors for Christ, as if God were appealing through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God." - 2 Corinthians 5:17-20

WHY DO WE DO THAT? **Catholic Life Explained:**

Question: What do the colors of the priest's and deacon's vestments mean?

Answer: In the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church, the colors of the vestments evolved over the course of several centuries and there was wide variation both in the colors used, and in the feasts and seasons associated with particular colors. It was Pope Innocent III (d. 1216) who gave us the basic outline that was later prescribed by Pope Saint Pius V in 1570. The various colors remind us of the dominant themes of a particular season or celebration.

White: Used for the seasons of Christmas and Easter and in celebrations of the Lord, of Mary, the angels, and saints who were not martyrs. This color is also used in Masses for the dead, at baptisms, weddings and other festive celebrations. Red: As the color of both blood and fire, red is used on Palm Sunday and Good Friday, as well as Pentecost and special celebrations of the Holy Spirit. Moreover, red is used on the feasts and memorials of the Apostles and those saints who died as martyrs. Violet: The color for Advent and Lent. Violet may also be used in Masses for the dead and on All Souls Day (November 2).

Green: A color of life and hope, green is used throughout Ordinary Time. Other colors: Rose may be used on the Third Sunday of Advent and the Fourth Sunday of Lent, black may be used in Masses of the dead and on All Souls Day, gold or silver may be used on solemn occasions in place of white, red, or green. ©LPi


