3RD SUNDAY OF LENT

Since the Passover of the Jews was near, Jesus went up to Jerusalem. He found in the temple area those who sold oxen, sheep, and doves, as well as the money changers seated there. He made a whip out of cords and drove them all out of the temple area. - In 2-13h-15a

Pastor's Message—From Father Dave

"Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?' He said to him, 'You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. The whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments." -Matthew 22: 36-40



Jesus didn't just teach His followers about love—He <u>showed</u> His followers what true love meant by laying down His life for each one of us. Genuine love for God and neighbor means that we must lay down our lives every day—in acts of forgiveness, charity, compassion, and generosity. But the reality of life is that there are times when we choose to act out of selfishness, anger, hatred, and lust. Because God gave each of us the gift of *free will*, we can choose between love and selfishness, between life and death. What happens when we choose to be selfish, when we choose death through our sin?

This deliberate choice to be self-centered, to be hurtful or to neglect the needs of others; this choice to give in to our selfish desires and passions is what we call "sin." First and foremost, sin is an offense against God, a break in our union with Him. At the same time, it damages or breaks our union with the Church. To restore the union with God and with His people, we must first open ourselves to the process of conversion. We must see that our hearts are heavy and hardened by sin and that God is the only one that can give us a new heart. Conversion is God's grace present in our lives, making our hearts return to Him. God gives us the strength to begin again, as we discover the awesome power and presence of God's love within us. It is in this discovery that we are shaken by the weight of sin in our lives, and we are filled with remorse and sadness, knowing that we have offended God by our sins and have separated ourselves from Him.

What do we do when we are so touched by God's grace that we see how we have sinned against Him and His people? How do we restore the union that has been bruised and broken by our own offenses? How do we "come back" to God when we have wandered far from Him? The Sacrament of Penance offers us the possibility of conversion, of beginning our life in Christ once again, and of restoring our relationship with God and with the Church. Through the ministry of the priest, who acts "in the person of Christ" when he presides over the Sacraments, the heart of God the Father should be revealed to the repentant sinner and the image of Christ the Good Shepherd should be seen in the priest's patience and compassion. The priest is, at the same time, "the sign and the instrument of God's merciful love for the sinner" (CCC #1465).

The Sacrament of Penance is a Sacrament of healing for us. We bring our lives infected by sin—to the priest, who serves as the "spiritual doctor" for his people. We open the wound that has been caused by sin, we name our sins, and we accept an act of penance from the priest, which is seen as a remedy for the infection of sin. Finally, we allow the infection to be removed by God's grace, spoken through the Prayer of Absolution offered by the priest and the fulfillment of the penance.

Please note that it is not the role of the priest to sit in judgment of the penitent. We are there to love, to guide, and to challenge. Some people say that they will not come to Confession because they are afraid that I will look at them differently outside of the Sacrament of Penance. The truth is, I do look at you differently. I love you even more because I have witnessed how God has brought about conversion in you and how you have responded in love to that call. All priests are also bound by the *"sacramental seal,"* which means that what the penitent has revealed to the priest remains "sealed" by the sacrament. The Church declares that every priest who hears confessions is bound under very severe penalties to keep absolute secrecy regarding what penitents have told him.

Next week I will write about the types of sin and how to prepare for the Sacrament of Penance.

"If we say, 'We are without sin,' we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we acknowledge our sins, He is faithful and just and will forgive our sins and cleanse us from every wrongdoing. If we say, 'We have not sinned,' we make Him a liar, and His word is not in us." –1 John 1:8-10




STATIONS OF THE CROSS

Listen, Love, Pray: A Lenten Evening of Reflection Join our family of parishes for an Evening of Reflection with Deacon Tim McNeil featuring the power of prayer. When the night is over, you'll forget about your watch, smartphone, and devices and be more aware of the people around you and their needs. You'll hear real-life testimony of how Jesus' life flows through others and witness the beauty of lifting a person to God.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? **Catholic Life Explained:**

Ouestion: Is it ever ok to leave Mass before it ends?

Answer: This is an interesting question because beneath the surface there seems to be an assumption that if it's okay, then why do we have to stay after we receive communion? The short answer is "no," but we definitely want to go a bit deeper as we consider why. First, when we think about questions like this, we must consider this in adult terms. If there is something gravely important that we need to do, then we must attend to that. However, if it is a matter of convenience or preference, then we really have to stop and think again. First, while we always want to recognize the importance of sacramental communion in the Mass, we also need to understand how important the time of thanksgiving and praver after communion is. This is summarized in the Prayer After Communion offered by the celebrant and then we are also commissioned to "Go forth" during the Dismissal of the Mass, reminding us that we have been entrusted with a gift — the Word of God and the Presence of Christ in the sacrament — and that we are to share that gift with others. If we simply leave after we receive communion, we risk two things. First, there is the possibility that we will turn our reception of communion into a purely personal, individual experience that is separated from our common experience of worship - and communion in the fullest sense and, second, we lose an opportunity for gratitude and serious reflection if we simply leave after communion. This time of thanksgiving, reflection, and, ultimately, missioning, are important and, in the end, an essential part of the celebration of the Mass. ©LPi


